LOCAL RED CROSS RESPONDS TO FOUR DISASTERS SINCE FRIDAY

Colorado Springs, CO – On Monday, September 14th, The American Red Cross Pikes Peak Chapter responded to 2 single family fires. These were the 3rd and 4th disasters that the Chapter responded to since Friday. On Friday, the Chapter provided assistance to 18 clients affected by a multi-family fire on Pale Rock and assistance to a family affected by a flood on Saturday. There have already been 10 local disasters in our area since the beginning of the Chapter's fiscal year on July 1st.

The Chapter dispatched a volunteer Disaster Action Team (DAT) to care for the people displaced by these disasters and to provide emergency assistance. Caseworkers from the Red Cross worked with the families to discuss and identify immediate needs resulting from the fire. Typically, basic human needs such as a safe place to stay, food, clothes, winter coats, necessary medications, and mental health counseling are addressed first.

In the last 2 1/2 months there have been 10 local disasters including 3 multi-family fires. Over 65 men, women, and children have been affected by these disasters. The Pikes Peak Chapter has expended over \$9,000 in direct relief to these disaster clients. These numbers are worrisome since this is only the beginning of the fire season and the fiscal year.

The Red Cross encourages people to be aware of, and safeguard against, these events in their homes by considering the following:

**Preparedness is your best defense against deadly fires.
Use these checklists to safeguard your home and family.**

To prevent fires before they start:

- Never leave burning candles or fireplaces unattended
- Keep fuel (paper, clothing, bedding) at least three feet away from heat sources
- Allow fireplace ashes to cool outside in a covered metal container, more than 10 feet from the house/deck, for a week before disposing in the trash.

To stay safe from fires:

- Create a home fire escape plan
- Practice your plan at least twice a year
- Install smoke alarms and escape ladders
- Replace smoke alarm batteries at least once a year
- Purchase and learn how to use fire extinguishers safely

The American Red Cross helps people prevent, prepare for and respond to emergencies. Last year, almost a million volunteers and 35,000 employees helped victims of almost 75,000 disasters; taught lifesaving skills to millions; and helped U.S. service members separated from their families stay connected. Almost 4 million people gave blood through the Red Cross, the largest supplier of blood and blood products in the United States. The American Red Cross is part of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement. An average of 91 cents of every dollar the Red Cross spends is invested in humanitarian services and programs.
